Introduction

The following information has been compiled in order to properly determine progress gained by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office during the past year. This information may be used to determine projections in crime, agency strengths, weaknesses, and manpower projections. This report will also be used as an aid to help analyze budget projections and financial expenditures.

One consideration when comparing the statistics presented is that often crimes reported are re-categorized during the police investigation or during criminal prosecution. Thus, the reported number does not always correspond to the number of crimes tabulated. Also, the different units inside the agency may clear the case without assistance. The reported numbers may vary from unit to unit inside the agency.

P.R.I.D.E.

On January 1, 2002 the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office changed its philosophy and complete organization of the agency.

Recognizing the need for more in-put from the citizens of Jefferson County and the desire to work hand-in-hand with the citizens, a program specifically designed for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office was put into place. After months of preparation, writing, reviews, and training P.R.I.D.E. became a reality.

The implementation of **P** (performance based solutions)

R (reduction of crime)

I (identification of resources)

D (demanding positive results)

E (emphasis on community improvement)

enables the entire Sheriff's Office to become a pro-active agency compared to a reactive agency. The entire Sheriff's Office is now geared toward community policing.

During the year of 2009, the P.R.I.D.E. program continued to grow with positive results for all involved, both the Sheriff's Office and the community. Quality of life issues have been addressed throughout the County with the community's participation.

The Sheriff's Office will continue to take PRIDE in what we do and encourage further participation and feedback from the citizens we serve through the sharing of information and ideas.

C.A.L.E.A

C.A.L.E.A. is an acronym for **Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies**. C.A.L.E.A. was established in 1979 as an independent accrediting authority by the four major law enforcement membership organizations: International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP); National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLES); National Sheriff's Association (NSA); and Police Executive Research Forum (PERF).

The C.A.L.E.A. accreditation process Recognizes Professional Excellence through commitment from all levels of a Law Enforcement organization. The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office successfully completed the inspection process and was recommended for accreditation by the C.A.L.E.A. inspectors. In March 2005, the agency was awarded its accreditation by C.A.L.E.A. Accreditation is an ongoing process that requires re-inspection by C.A.L.E.A. Assessors every three years. During those years audits and inspections are continually handled to ensure the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office is maintaining their prestigious status of being accredited. The C.A.L.E.A. assessors returned in December 2007 for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office first re-accreditation which was awarded March 2008 in Atlanta Georgia. The Sheriff's Office is scheduled for an on-site inspection in December 2010.

RECORDS UNIT

The Records Division processed 1477 request from citizens for copies of reports in 2009, this does not include the processing of appropriate reports to other law enforcement agencies and inter-office reports on a daily basis. In addition to these copies, approximately 6000 inquiries were made during 2009 from both within and outside of the Sheriff's Office concerning reports. This represents an increase from 2008 of 27 or 1.8%.

PART ONE CRIMES

HOMICIDE

There were 3 homicides in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 1 or 50%. One homicide is considered cleared because the suspect is in federal custody and a warrant will be served upon his release and two were cleared by arrest.

RAPE

There were 39 rapes reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 10 or 20%. Twelve rapes are under investigation, 16 were cleared by arrest and 11 are inactive.

ROBBERY

There were 18 robberies reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 7 or 28%. No robberies are under investigation 8 were cleared by arrest, and 10 are inactive.

ARSON

There were 25 arson cases reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 10 or 29%. Three arsons are under investigation, 4 were cleared by arrest, and 18 are inactive.

ASSAULT

There were 589 assaults reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 37 or 7%. One hundred and sixty-nine assaults are under investigation, 289 were cleared by arrest, and 131 are inactive.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

There were 1106 domestic violence offenses reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 148 or 15 %. Three hundred seventy-two reported cases are under investigation, 734 were cleared by arrest, and none are inactive.

BURGLARY

There were 441 burglaries reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 10 or 2%. Of the 441 reported, 2 were an attempt only, 369 were residential and 72 were commercial. Ten burglaries are under investigation, 34 were cleared by arrest, and 325 are inactive.

LARCENY

There were 1969 larceny incidents reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 914 or 32%. Of the 1969 reported, 1360 were misdemeanors and 608 were felonies. Sixty-five are under investigation, 126 were cleared by arrest, and 1778 are inactive.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

There were 208 stolen vehicles reported in Jefferson County in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 16 or 8%. Three thefts are under investigation, 15 were cleared by arrest, and 190 are inactive.

C.A.R.E. UNIT

Computer Aided Record Entry

The C.A.R.E. System is a computer aided reporting writing system that allows officers to voice record reports into a computer system, having clerical employees retrieve and transcribe the report, thus allowing the officer to return to his/her normal duties. The C.A.R.E. System was partially implemented during the latter part of 1997.

During January – December of 2009 there were a total of 17,169 reports transcribed. This represents an increase from 2008 of 249 or 1.4%.

CIVIL PROCESS UNIT

The Civil Process Division of the Sheriff's Office handled 26,541 papers during 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 105 or .04%.

Fees collected from Civil Papers Served in the amount of \$542,366.26 were turned into the County Treasurer's Office. This represents an increase from 2008 of \$36,212.32 or 7%.

WARRANTS UNIT

In 2009 the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office received a total of 12,853 new Jefferson County warrants and 929 warrants from other agencies for a grand total of 13,782 this represents an increase from 2008 of 3,057 or 29%.

Of the 8693 Traffic Warrants approximately 80% are Contempt of Court-Default Payment of Fine.

The total number of active warrants on file as of December 31, 2009 was 11957 this represents an increase from 2008 of 5910 or 98%. This is the total amount of warrants on file from 1999 – 2009.

In 2009 there were 6605 active Jefferson County warrants served, this is an increase from 2008 of 2599 or 65%.

EVIDENCE UNIT

Evidence Custodian's activities for 2009 are as follows:

Seventeen (17) trips to the Missouri State Highway Patrol to pick up and deliver evidence. This is an increase from 2008 of 2 or 13%.

One hundred thirty-five (135) releases of evidence to lawful owners. This is an increase from 2008 of 13 or 11%

One (1) trip to Shapiro for Destruction of Evidence. This is no change from 2008.

Elimination of Evidence – 790 cases destroyed. This is a decrease from 2008 of 367 cases or 32%.

Seventeen (17) reviews of evidence by Prosecuting Attorney's Office. This is an increase from 2008 of 3 or 21%.

Four (4) releases to other agencies.

Destroyed numerous items classified as "Abandoned Property" in accordance with State Statues.

Destroyed property in accordance with Destruction Orders and Orders of Refusal issued by the Prosecuting Attorney's Office. Destroyed all non-contraband evidence in accordance with applicable law.

Destroyed drug evidence with 3 controlled burns using the "Drug Terminator" burner.

Evidence case files processed for 2009 totaled 2,904. This is an increase from 2008 of 333 or 13%. This number indicates each file only, not the amount of evidence processed.

Evidence picked up at North, East, and South Zones on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

SHERIFF'S AUCTION

There was one Sheriff's Auction held on August 29, 2009. Proceeds of \$9,970.50 were turned into the Jefferson County Treasures office.

CONCEAL CARRY PERMITS

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office began issuing Conceal Carry Permits March 26, 2004. During 2009 a total of 1515 applications were processed, 1460 applications were approved, 24 applications denied, and no applications were revoked. See the following page for gender and age breakdown.

Conceal Carry Permits are approved for a three year period, 2009 was the third year for applicants to renew their permits. During 2009 a total of 201 applications for renewal were processed, 201 were approved, 0 applicants were denied, and 0 applicants revoked.

Fees collected from Conceal Carry Permits issued and renewed in 2009 in the amount of \$161,660.00 were turned into the County Sheriff's Revolving Fund. This is an increase from 2008 of \$51,870 or 47%. Fees paid in 2009 to the Missouri State Highway Patrol and the Federal Bureau of Investigation of \$33.25 per fingerprint processing totaled \$50,373.75. This is an increase from 2008 of \$18,886.00 or 60%

GRANTS

During 2009 the Sheriff's Office participated in 24 grants with federal monies in the amount of \$2,269,236.92, this is an increase from 2008 of \$650,904.41 or 40%. Local matching monies are in the amount of \$168,828.58, this is an increase from 2008 of 13,779.87 or 9%.

TRAINING

During 2009 the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office continued with additional training for all of its officers and civilian staff. This training is essential, not only for officer safety but to provide the citizens of Jefferson County with the best-qualified officers available. This training was held in numerous areas of the Agency.

Once again in 2009 Jefferson County Sheriff's Office entered into a contract with the Jefferson College Police Training Institute located on the campus of Jefferson College in Hillsboro and also Jefferson College North Campus, Arnold. Officers were required to attend specific courses as directed by the Sheriff's Office and could attend other courses, at no expense to the officer, on a voluntary basis on their own time.

In addition to academy hours, numerous hours of training was completed in-house by Jefferson County Sheriff's Office certified instructors to include firearms, canine, tactical response units, pepper spray, baton training, correction officer training and other courses as deemed necessary.

Along with officer training in these areas, employees (to include officers, non-commissioned personnel, and clerical) also received training and certifications, provided by REJIS, on investigative/law enforcement computers to enhance their job knowledge and investigative skills.

The total training hours received in 2009 for Jefferson County Sheriff's Office was 9,832 hours. This is a decrease from 2008 of 520 hours or 5%.

JAIL DIVISION

BOOKING

In 2009 there were a total of 9252 prisoners booked with the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office Jail. This represents an increase from 2008 of 932 or 11%. The average inmate population per day in 2009 was 194, an increase of 22 inmates per day or 13%.

FOOD SERVICE SECTION

During 2009 the Food Service Section of the Jail Division served 206,594 meals to inmates at the Jefferson County Jail. In addition, 21,843 meals were served to Juvenile. This makes a grand total of 228,437 meals served by the Food Service Section. This represents an increase from 2008 of 28,744 meals or 14%.

TRANSPORT

In 2009 the Transport Division handled a total of 4477 different types of transports. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 281 incidents or 6%.

BAILIFF

There are a total of 12 courtrooms manned by the Bailiffs. See attached for hourly breakdown for monthly statistics in and out of Court.

PRISONER HOUSING

In 2009 we housed prisoners for the Hillsboro Police Departments and the US Army. The total amount of monies collected was \$2509.00. This represents an increase from 2008 of \$2,151.00 or 607%. The amount of monies paid to other agencies for housing our prisoners totaled \$6,790.00. This represents a decrease from 2008 of \$2,865.00 or 27%.

SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

In 2009 our jail facility reported a total of 2500 persons incarcerated, of those 7 receiving social security benefits had their benefits stopped. Our agency received \$2,000.00 in benefits from Social Security Administration. This is an increase from 2008 of 3 individuals and \$400.00 or 25%.

COMMISSARY

In 2009 the Jail Commissary had orders totaling \$62,144.77. This represents an increase from 2008 of \$18,519.49 or 42%.

The yearly bill was \$53,917.91. This represents an increase from 2008 of \$15,242.63 or 39%. The yearly profit was \$8,226.86. This represents an increase from 2008 of \$3,226.86 or 66%.

JEFFERSON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE
NORTH ZONE OFFICE

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office North Zone Office located in High Ridge continued to serve the general public during 2009.

At this facility the Sheriff's Office has the capability of booking non-violent arrested persons thus allowing the officer to drop off his/her prisoner and return to their road assignment instead of transporting their prisoner to the jail facility in Hillsboro. During 2009 there were 13 prisoners booked and 0 prisoners bonded from the North Zone. This represents a decrease from 2008 by 5 or 28% of booked prisoners and a decrease by 3 or 100% of bonded prisoners from the North Zone. There were 1680 walk-ins in 2009. This represents an increase of 465 or 38%.

The North Zone Evaluator handled a total of 1691 reports to include reports taken, administration reports, and NRN reports. This is a decrease from 2008 of 780 or 32%. A total of 209 reports were reassigned to the Patrol Division for officer contact. This is a decrease from 2008 of 77 or 27%.

JEFFERSON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE
SOUTH ZONE OFFICE

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office South Zone Office located on the Jefferson College Campus in Hillsboro continued to serve the general public during 2009.

This facility is staffed on a part-time basis. During hours when the South Zone Office is open for normal business citizens may contact the South Zone Office, in person, and obtain criminal history checks.

During hours when the South Zone Office is closed, officers and supervisors use the zone office to write reports, handle administration functions and other duties as needed.

The South Zone Office is a non-booking facility for arrested persons.

JEFFERSON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE
EAST ZONE OFFICE

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office East Zone Office located on the Windsor Campus in Imperial continued to serve the general public during 2009.

This facility is staffed on a full-time basis during normal business hours. During hours when the East Zone Office is closed for normal business, officers and supervisors use the office for report writing, administrative functions, and citizen's meetings.

Citizens may obtain criminal history checks and fingerprints by coming in person to the East Zone Office during normal business hours. Upon contacting the East Zone Office, citizens will be speaking with personnel assigned to and familiar with their respective areas.

During 2009 there were 530 walk-ins; this represents an increase from 2008 of 124 or 31%

The East Zone Office is a non-booking facility for arrested persons.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS UNIT

In 2009 the total combined Internal Affairs Investigations totaled 24, compared to 30 in 2008. All of the Internal Affairs Investigations were conducted for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. There were 11 citizen complaints and 13 staff complaints. Of the 24 complaints, 7 were Sustained, 3 were Not-Sustained, 3 were Unfounded, 5 were Exonerated, 4 are Pending, and 2 are Closed.

There were 71 Use of force investigations during 2009. Twelve from the East Zone, 10 from the North Zone, 11 from the South Zone, none from the Detectives, 1 from the Narcotics Unit, 1 from the Traffic Unit, 1 from the SERT Team, and 34 from the Jail Division.

The Professional Standards Unit's Internal Affairs Inspector conducted 40 background investigations in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 1 or 3%.

The Professional Standards Unit Internal Affairs Inspector handled 67 Computer Voice Stress Analysis. Of the 67 analysis, 42 were Criminal, 9 were Internal Affairs Test, and 16 were Pre-Employment test. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 18 or 21%.

The Accident Review Board handled 25 Internal Accident Investigations in 2009. Of the 25 investigations, 17 were Non-Negligent Accidents, and 8 were Negligent Accidents. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 10 or 29%.

The Professional Standards Unit conducted 1 Gang Awareness Seminar, assisted in 3 Sheriff's Citizens Academy, and hosted 2 Computer Voice Stress Analysis (CVSA) certification classes.

In March 2008 the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office received its CALEA Re-accreditation. In 2009 the Professional Standards Unit commander completed the CALEA Assessor training in Virginia. The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office will have its CALEA on-site inspection in December 2010.

The Professional Standards Unit started conducting Audits and Staff Inspections of all Jefferson County Sheriff's Office individual Units in 2006. A total of 12 audits were performed in 2009.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT UNIT

The year 2005 saw the start of the new traffic enforcement unit for the Sheriff's Office. The traffic unit was implemented at the same time that Jefferson County started its own municipal court.

The main focus of the traffic enforcement unit is to reduce the number of injury and non-injury crashes on county roadways.

All Deputies assigned to the unit have attended different types of training throughout the year to better enable them to function as a traffic enforcement unit.

VICTIM SERVICES COORDINATOR

A total of 1106 domestic violence reports were reported to the states Uniform Crime Report (UCR) during 2009. Of the 1106 reports 1045 of them were involving adults, and therefore reviewed by the Victim Services Coordinator. This represents an increased from 2008 of 188 or 22%. Of the reports reviewed, 283 or 27% were repeat calls. There were 156 contacts made with victims of domestic violence for the purpose of education and referral.

The Victim Services Coordinator also serves as Project Director for a grant funded program, DVERT (Domestic Violence Enhanced Response Team). The DVERT Unit received 523 referrals, and the DVERT Detectives were called out on 39 cases during 2009.

It is believed that the increase in both domestic violence reports and repeat reports is a result of the DVERT Unit being able to respond quickly to victims. As a result of establishing rapport with the DVERT Unit, victims are more educated about domestic violence, feel more empowered, and therefore more likely to call and file police reports, knowing that that they have the help and support of the team.

The Victims Services Coordinator handled 179 phone calls in 2009 regarding case status or information regarding the court process. There were ten new deputies that received orientation regarding domestic violence. There were 28 Crime Victim Verification forms completed. The Victim Services Coordinator attends community meetings such as the Family Violence Council and Community Service Forum, and attended a total of 43 meetings and trainings this year. Public relation contacts with fellow community agencies and organizations totaled 152. The Victim Services Coordinator also provided disciplinary hearings for 22 Jefferson County jail inmates to review punishment in accordance to rule violations.

SEX-OFFENDER REGISTRATION

The Victim Services Coordinator also handles Sex Offender registration for the Sheriff's Office, and answered 573 calls and e-mails with questions regarding sex offender registration policies. There were 949 sex offender registrations completed in 2009, and the Prosecuting Attorney's office filed charges on eight offenders that have failed to register. There were nine certified letters sent to offenders reminding them of their duty to comply with registration. Address verifications were requested and completed on 436 offenders.

DETECTIVE BUREAU

In 2009 the Detective Bureau handled 935 cases. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 90 or 9%. The Drug Task Force handled 467 cases. This represents an increase of 56 or 14%. The total cases handled by all Detective Bureau Units were 1402. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 34 or 2%.

In 2009 497 cases were carried over from 2008 for a total of 1432 cases. Of the 1432 cases 400 were cleared or 28% and 597 were inactive or 42%. There were 8 cold case homicides in 2009. This represents no change from 2008. There were 148 missing person cases in 2009 with 2 cases still outstanding.

In addition to Jefferson County cases assigned, detectives spent a total of 58.5 hours in court this represents an increase from 2008 of 14.5 or 33%. Detectives worked 43 hours on Major Case Squad investigations, which is a decrease from 2008 of 100 or 70%. Detectives also worked 92 hours assisting other agencies, which is a decrease from 2008 of 54 or 37%.

DRUG TASK FORCE

During 2009 the Jefferson County Municipal Enforcement Group, Drug Task Force generated 467 new cases. This represents an increase from 2008 of 56 or 14%. J.C.M.E.G. investigators conducted 67 covert purchases of illegal narcotics. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 36 or 35%.

In 2009 J.C.M.E.G. received and investigated 454 intelligence reports. This is an increase from 2008 of 136 or 43%. Narcotics detectives signed and utilized 70 new informants. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 5 or 7%.

During 2009 J.C.M.E.G. seized \$90,625.00 U.S. currency. This represents a decrease from 2008 of \$460,760.00 or 84%.

During 2009 the J.C.M.E.G. Drug Task Force was responsible for the seizure and dismantling of 217 methamphetamine laboratories. This represents an increase from 2008 of 16 or 8%. The Jefferson County municipalities vary in the number and frequency of labs located within their respective zip codes. Below is the breakdown of these labs.

Arnold had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 30 days, with a total of 11 labs, accounting for 5 % of the total number of labs in the county.

Cedar Hill had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 13 days, with a total of 24 labs, accounting for 9 % of the total number of labs in the county.

Desoto had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 10 days, with a total of 33 labs, accounting for 15 % of the total number of labs in the county.

Dittmer a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 19 days, with a total of 18 labs, accounting for 8 % of the total number of labs in the county.

Fenton had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 23 days, with a total of 16 labs, accounting for 7 % of the total number of labs in the county.

Festus had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 20 days, with a total of 18 labs, accounting for 8 % of the total number of labs in the county.

High Ridge had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 15 days, with a total of 23 labs, accounting for 10 % of the total number of labs in the county.

Hillsboro had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 28 days, with a total of 11 labs, accounting for 5 % of the total number of labs in the county.

House Springs had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 9 days, with a total of 36 labs, accounting for 16 % of the total number of labs in the county.

Imperial had a methamphetamine laboratory incident occur approximately once every 21 days, with a total of 17 labs, accounting for 8 % of the total number of labs in the county.

The remaining methamphetamine laboratories were located in other zip codes and municipalities.

All other cities had too few labs to note.

CRIMINAL IDENTIFICATION UNIT

In 2009 the County of Jefferson Administration Office took responsibility for employee identification photos.

The Evidence Technician responded to 55 crime scenes in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 32 or 139%.

In addition to the above in 2009, the Criminal Identification Division / Evidence Technician processed numerous pieces of evidence, photo requests, fingerprinting assignments, and federal firearm license requests. See attached for complete breakdown.

The AFIS (Automated Fingerprint Identification System) is used to identify an individual by their fingerprint.

CHILD FATALITY REVIEW BOARD

In 2009 there were a total of 8 cases reviewed by the Child Fatality Review Board. Of these cases 8 were investigated by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. The 8 investigated by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office represent a decrease from 2008 by 4 or 31%.

F.A.S.T. TEAM

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office F.A.S.T. Team was implemented with the responsibility of reducing the number of outstanding warrants through the aggressive pursuit of individuals that are avoiding arrest. The units mainly focus on individuals that are wanted for felonies, avoiding capture, and considered dangerous.

The F.A.S.T. Team was disbanded in 2009 due manpower and funding shortages. A grant to fund the team was applied for in 2009. If approved, the team will be activated in 2010.

S.E.R.T.

(SHERIFF'S EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM)

The S.E.R.T. Team is a tactical response unit that responds to incidents where specialized skills, training, and equipment are needed. The response team is a unit of 18 officers. This year the Sheriff authorized personnel from Arnold and Herculaneum Police Departments to be specifically assigned to the response team. Of the 18 person response unit 3 are from the Arnold Police Department and 2 are from the Herculaneum Police Department.

During 2009 S.E.R.T. was utilized in 8 incidents. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 4 or 33%.

TEAM TRAINING

The Response Team conducted 2,640 cumulative hours of in service training.
The Negotiator Team conducted 192 cumulative hours of in service training.

OUTSOURCED TRAINING

The Response Team attended 528 hours of tactical training, conducted by outsourced providers.
The Negotiator Team attended no hours of training conducted by outsourced providers.

CANINE UNIT

During 2009 the Canine Division received a total of 255 assignments. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 21 or 8%. Of these assignments, 249 were on-duty assignments and 6 were off-duty assignments.

During 2009 the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office Canine Division was called for 16 county agencies assists; this represents a decrease from 2008 of 16 or 30%. There were 7 out of county agency assists; this represents a decrease from 2008 of 6 or 46%. During 2009 the shift usage showed K-9's were used more during the shift of 0600 hours to 1800 hours.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS UNIT
D.A.R.E.

The year 2009 was the eighteenth year for participation by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office in the D.A.R.E. Program. D.A.R.E. is the acronym for Drug Abuse Resistance Education.

In 2009 we instructed our D.A.R.E. program to 83 classes, offering the program to approximately 1,860 students.

During 2009, the Community Relations Unit participated in 115 Public Relation events. This represents an increase from 2008 of 10 or 10%.

Meeting sessions included civic organizations and school related meetings. The Community Relations Unit attended 51 meetings in 2009. This represents an increase from 2008 of 18 or 35%.

The Community Relations Unit conducted 40 Deputy training sessions. Training sessions include conferences, CEUs and inter-office. This represents an increase from 2008 of 12 or 43%.

The Community Relations Unit continues to be an effective vehicle in the education and training of drug and alcohol awareness, as well as safety information for school teachers, students/children, and citizens throughout Jefferson County.

SHERIFF'S CITIZEN ACADEMY

The first Sheriff's Citizen Academy was established in September of 1998, since its inception there have been 300 graduates.

The Sheriff's Citizen Academy allows citizens an insight into some of the duties of a Jefferson County Sheriff's Deputy. This twelve-week class meets once a week for a three-hour period. Instructors are current command level officers and/or officers specializing in a particular field.

During the academy, citizens are introduced to various topics to include administrative functions, community relations, special operations, methods of investigation, specialty fields, use of force scenarios, and uniform patrol responsibilities. Tours are also incorporated into this twelve-week course. Graduates of the Sheriff's Citizen Academy always seem to enjoy the "ride-along" with a Deputy and participating in firearms training by using the firearms simulator.

After graduation graduates may join the S.A.V.E. (see related section for further information) organization and volunteer their services if they wish.

To request enrollment into the Sheriff's Citizen Academy, citizens may contact the Sheriff's Office at 636-797-5020 for an application. Classes are normally offered twice a year and are kept small for better hands-on and class participation.

SHERIFF'S ALUMNI VOLUNTEER ECHELON
(S.A.V.E.)

The Sheriff's Alumni Volunteer Echelon (S.A.V.E.) volunteers have assisted the Sheriff's Office in various community events throughout the year. The members have been trained in the basic functions of community relations' field, and contribute valuable man-hours in child fingerprinting, sewing, filling, DWI impact panel, and sex offender registration.

S.A.V.E. contributed 1,303.5 hours of community serves directly to the Sheriff's Office; this represents an increase from 2008 of 244 hours or 23%.

There were 43 active members in 2009. This represents a decrease from 2008 of 17 or 28%.

DWI ARRESTS

DEPARTMENT – WIDE

In 2009 there were a total of 786 DWI arrests handled by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. This represents an increase from 2008 of 19 or 2%.

RADAR TRAILERS / 777 VEHICLE REPORT

During 2009 the North Zone and East Zone were assigned the radar trailers and the South Zone was assigned the 777 Vehicle.

Trailer # 1 assigned to the North Zone usage was documented beginning June 2009. It was deployed 69 days and down for maintenance 12 days.

Trailer # 3 assigned to the East Zone usage was documented beginning June 2009. It was deployed 131 days and down for maintenance 7 days.

Vehicle # 777 assigned to the South Zone was deployed 205 days and it was down for maintenance 15 days in 2009.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

In 2009 the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office continued to participate in the Safe School Act program. The schools participating in this program are, Northwest High, Northwest Valley, Fox C-6 (Seckman High School), and Windsor C-1. All school districts are located in unincorporated Jefferson County. S.R.O. grant was unable to continue providing funding for the Jefferson R-7 and Grandview R-2 school districts.

The School Resource Officers interact with teachers and students and answer calls for service within the school districts. In 2009 School Resource Officers answered 458 calls for service. This represents an increase from 2008 of 47 or .08%.

With on-going concerns and threats within the school districts throughout Jefferson County, as well as the rest of the country, the School Resource Officer has become a proactive part of today's school society. The School Resource Officer keeps apprised of potential problems within the schools districts and continually works on maintaining an open flow of communications with school faculty, administration, students, parents, courts, and citizens of the district.

It has become evident that the presences of a Sheriff's Deputy and the communications they have established within the school districts have been a positive influence not only for the school districts but also for the Sheriff's Deputy's image. Due to our nations increase in violence at school it is apparent that the School Resource Officer has become a fixture in today's society. Not only is he/she used as a deterrent to crime in the schools, the officer is ultimately established as a positive mentor for the students.

PARKS UNIT

The Park Deputies responsibilities are to patrol and secure the safety of citizens that visit all unincorporated parks located in Jefferson County. In 2009 there were 169 calls for service in Jefferson County Parks. This represents an increase from 2008 of 111 or 191%.
